

## Amend HB 69: An Act to Integrate Multicultural Experiences into the NC Standard Course of Study

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America's history is a dynamic and complex chronology of events that provoke a range of emotions, good and bad. On one hand, this chronology highlights the tenacity and pioneer spirit of the Founders, but on the other hand, it reveals the legacy of the
