



Constance Lav Johnson for NC State Superintendent of Public Instruction, Election 2020, to Serve 2021-2025

Constance Lav Johnson is a candidate for NC State Superintendent of Public Instruction. She officially filed on December 4, 2019. The Primary Election for State Superintendent of Public Instruction is March 3, 2020, and the General Election is November 3, 2020.

Johnson was a teacher, school counselor, and school administrator. As Publisher of CityPolitical Magazine, Constance Partee Lav Johnson teaches the constituents of states about the process for changing laws for improved communications for activism, to increase scholastic scores for children and youth, and to ensure that ethical officials are elected to maintain justice for those without a voice.

She believes that the nation's children are not achieving at the academic level they are capable of. The Education leaders fail to develop programs and an infrastructure that ensures they can compete to secure good jobs that pay gainful wages. Johnson now seeks to educate youth about learning and the beauty of literacy. Her programs are designed to increase interest in education, social networks, the political process, and empirical real-life experiences.

Constance Lav Johnson, MA, is a member of a family of School Teachers since 1898 in NC. Her father taught school for 35 years. Her great-great grandfather, Robert Partee, whose paintings hang in the county offices, invested and donated land to build schools and colleges in Rowan County, NC.

She has a Master of Education from the University of Maryland; Bachelors of Education, Psychology, Sociology from Livingstone College; earned the credits to complete a degree and certification in chaplaincy at the Lutheran School of Theology, (60 hours in Theology).

Johnson is a Member of the North Carolina State Parent Teacher Association (NCPTA) Governance Committee; a Lifetime Member of the Black Political Caucus of Charlotte-Mecklenburg and former Chair of Public Relations; the NEA and NCAE (NC Association of Educators) in her race for the State Senate in 2014; the Greater Charlotte Alliance of Black Educators, the NAACP; and the Tri-County Medical Association of Iredell, Mecklenburg, Rowan, and Yadkin Counties.
